1.1 INTRODUCTION

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

The University of Mumbai, with which the J.K. College of Science & Commerce is affiliated, sets the curriculum. Co-curricular activities are added to the curriculum to ensure students' employability and all-round development. Program objectives are specified in detail and correspond with course objectives. A total of 27 add-on Certificate courses were added to the curriculum to guarantee skills development, employability, and entrepreneurial qualities. Maximum no of students complete assignments, go on field trips and participate in activities that emphasize experiential learning. The curriculum incorporates cross-cutting themes and various cocurricular activities are organized to make students sensitized related to human values, gender, ethics, and environmental issues.

Every academic year begins with an orientation program designed to familiarize students with the college's code of conduct, curriculum, and exams. HoDs of all departments communicate workload, timetable, and lecture schedule, which is then distributed to students via WhatsApp groups. Every faculty assists students with lecture notes & collects assignments via Google Classroom. The Examination Committee plans both Regular and Supplementary Examinations well in advance, adhering to the academic calendar and the UoM schedule. HoDs and the Principal make sure that the curriculum is taught well and that the completion of the syllabus is verified using a variety of feedback systems. Remedial lectures are scheduled for slow learners and are assisted to make them prepare for the exams. Mentoring lectures are scheduled to assist students in motivating them for their career-related goals, guiding them, and preparing them for their future achievements. Students are surveyed halfway through the course and again at the end to gauge the quality of instruction and to learn more about their requirements.

The IQAC works with all the departments to organize the gathering, analyzing, and integration of suggestions for improvement. The college provides 07 undergraduate programs. Regular schedules for lectures, practicals, and tutorials are adhered to, and department heads keep an eye on curriculum fulfillment.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

Teaching, learning and evaluation play a very crucial role in the growth of any educational institution. Tilak Education Society's J K College of Science & Commerce Ghansoli believes in value-based education coordinated with practical learning. The admission process is transparent and admission of students to various courses is done according to the guidelines of the University of Mumbai and the Government of Maharashtra. The Admission Committee monitors fair and transparent admission processes and does counselling of students helping them in admissions.

The institution has a robust and transparent evaluation system as evidenced by the functioning of the examination committee, the evaluation mechanism, the grievance redressal mechanism etc. The College follows the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) and adheres to the guidelines given by the University of Mumbai in the evaluation process. Students are guided to good practical knowledge by participating in intercollegiate competitions and also are motivated to participate in university-level Avishkar and are provided with guidance for Research Projects. Add-on courses are also organised by the college to provide extra knowledge to students.

Teachers adopt many interactive and innovative teaching methods to make the process of teaching-learning interesting for making all-round development of students. Teaching plans are prepared and followed, ICT-based teaching-learning is promoted, updates are made in methods of teaching-learning, and co-curricular and extracurricular activities are promoted for the students' improvements. The evaluation process adopted by the college includes Seminars, Projects, Oral Tests, Home Assignments, and Tutorials, ICT facilities also encourage them to take part in real-time projects.

The college has a simple admission procedure with a good demand ratio for the programmes offered at the undergraduate level. For admission, criteria and processes laid down by the University of Mumbai and the Government of Maharashtra are followed and applications are invited online for the first-year degree programmes.

The advanced learners are provided an opportunity to enrol in the Honours programme, a co-curricular activity pioneered by J K College, that provides an opportunity for further academic exploration.

Research, Innovations and Extension

The College has set-up a Research Cell in order to promote and grow the research culture not only among the staff members but also learners. Few of the staff members have actively received grants from NGOs for minor research related work. Faculties take active part in presenting Research work / paper in National as well as international conferences. Institute has also organized International Conferences, Faculty Development programs. Institute also has conducted an online National Level Workshop on "NEP-2020". Faculty members are involved as an Author and Co- Author in curriculum related Books with renowned publishers.

College has set up NSS and DLLE as extension activities to contribute actively towards community, student's

sensitization & holistic development of students towards community.

College has also received certain awards towards community, environmental issues for using best policies. College has various collaborations and MoUs initiated with professional bodies for the betterment of students to step stone in the corporate world.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

Adequate Physical facilities are provided to support teaching and learning in J.K College of Science and Commerce.

The College has also registered for the education domain with the Government of India. College also offered all Google products in order to Enhance communication, Enrich class experiences and Encourage original work.

A wide range of activities can be conducted on campus, including certificate courses, co-curricular & extracurricular activities, campus recruitment events and training classes, seminars, conferences etc.

Sports activities are available on the college ground.

In addition to providing excellent infrastructure for teaching-learning experiences, the institution offers value added programmes & activities such as Technical & Non-Technical Clubs, Activity based learning, and Laboratory oriented theory classes, which bridge academic teaching gaps and meet industry requirements.

All the computers are equipped with updated software's and advanced technical aids to learn programming, web designing, and app-development to hone critical and analytical skills.

The college is equipped with a dedicated broadband Internet connection for enterprising students to get a chance to be familiar with the Internet. They do comprehensive research for their projects and presentations.

The library is Spacious, well ventilated & lighted with a total area of 1750 Sq.Ft. The College Library is equipped with a large number of books, journals with Open access facility. Students and faculties can also refer relevant subject textbooks from the library for reference.

An exclusive facility is provided with a dedicated yoga teacher for training both the students and faculty. Students and faculty actively participate in the International Day of Yoga every year on June 21st. Self-defense training is provided to the girl students through Karate. Trained coaches train the potential sports persons regularly.

Institutional preparedness for NEP

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:	Vision of the institution is towards holistic development of the learners, human values and social skills which is a result of interdisciplinary study and value-based education which integrates science, commerce and spirituality in order to attain the goal of multidisciplinary education in college. College also facilitates multidisciplinary courses which helps the students to be ready for industry with business or job.
2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	ABC has been evolved since NEP 2020. It offers multiple entry and exit to students and also perform various courses simultaneously. This step is highly welcomed in order to foster mobility of the learners. This is a new initiative and it will have wider role for flexible pathways for higher learning. Institution is preparing with various skill development courses, more tie ups to bridge the gap between industry- academia linkages.
3. Skill development:	Institute has setup Centre for Skill Development. It offers various add on courses such as basics of mutual fund, personal financing, competitive exam, data visualisation and tableau, advance excel, cloud computing, public speaking, tally and GST etc. Institute also has extension activities like NSS, DLLE which helps to improve social, emotional, skills of the students. College also offers various workshops, Student Development Programmes, Literary association, nature club which results in holistic development of learners. To develop language skills Marathi Vangmay Mandal is also set up. Also, college library covers various books in regional language.
4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):	IKS plays most important role in NEP'2020. India's culture and heritage is vast and has huge base towards India's traditions. Institution has organised National Level workshops to teachers. Also college cultural fest theme for 2023-24 is kept on GYANUTSAV (Where Tradition meets Tomorrow) under the banner of "Avahan 2k24" The library of college also is equipped with books on IKS. College also conducts various seminars/session/dance/food competition music's under Indian Knowledge System. College also has Marathi Vangmay Mandal through which "Marathi Bhasha Divas" is also celebrated. Many teachers/faculty members have also completed training/workshop on IKS organised under

	PMMMT and Bhishma School of Indian Knowledge System.
5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):	The college is organising industrial visit, field trips for practical understanding the subject. Students are informed the subject not only with lectures but also guests lectures, expert guidance sessions, hands-on training related to practicability enhancement of the subject. Various webinars, workshops are also hosted in which students are asked for overall organisation of same. The students are also undergoing involved in project work which includes field visits. All the programs offered have specific outcomes and course specific outcomes as well.
6. Distance education/online education:	Since pandemic teachers are using google classrooms, official WhatsApp groups of students, it has become very common and easy mode to connect with students. Teachers are showing various online videos in classroom focusing more on blended education. Some of the expert guidance sessions are also conducted through Zoom/Google meet like Apps. College has set up its WhatsApp Channel on which various videos of teachers are uploaded for betterment of students. Skill development centre of the institution is conducting the add on courses in blended mode, so that it will be convenient for maximum students to participate.

Response:

JK College of Science and Commerce, Ghansoli offers undergraduate programs in Arts, Science and Commerce streams. It is affiliated to the University of Mumbai. The college offers programs under Choice Based Credit, Grading and Semester System (CBGS) implemented from the academic session 2016-17 onwards.

The college has its own academic calendar which is in consonance with the academic calendar of the affiliating university, i.e. university of Mumbai. The College Development Committee, the College Planning and Evaluation Committee, and the Internal Quality Assurance Cell meet at the beginning of every academic session, comprising the Principal, IQAC in charge, Heads of Departments, and all Faculties.

The committee in charge of examinations and feedback Committee review the previous year's performance and develop an action plan for the current year for attaining academic excellence through proper calculation of course and program outcome attainment. Teachers prepare comprehensive pedagogical plans, which are recorded daily in academic diaries and syllabus completion certificates are maintained by each department. Principal, Administrative Officer, and Head of Department make up the institution's regulatory body, which oversees classes and other academic activities.

College provides admission to both slow learners as well as to advance learners. For diverse strata of students, a comprehensive continuous assessment system is in place to facilitate mentoring, remedial classes, bridge courses, and advanced learning programs. Students are introduced to human values, environmental sustainability, and ethical issues in a variety of courses. The institution also has a feedback system inclusive of feedback related to the entire ambience of campus with infrastructure, academics and teaching learning practice, curriculum, and placement, which is used to gather input from students, teachers, alumni, employers, and parents to improve the institution's development and growth.

As an affiliated college of the University of Mumbai, College is unable to develop its own curriculum. Though the curriculum has been adapted to the practical situations, efforts have been made to go beyond the prescribed framework. The curriculum for the undergraduate programs in the institution are designed by the Academic Board of Studies of the University of Mumbai according to UGC guidelines. - In the computer science and Information technology program, sustainability is incorporated into the syllabus through green Technology and green Information and Technology.

2.3.1. Student-centric methods- experiential learning, participative learning, problem-solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences using ICT tools.

J.K. College of Science & Commerce, Ghansoli, provides an effective learning management platform for students to develop the latest skills, knowledge, attitudes, and values to shape their careers. The college consistently gives experiential learning to students through innovative programs which stimulate the creative ability of students and provide them with a platform to nurture their problem-solving skills and ensure participative learning. Enterprise Resource Planning (ERP) is a significant component of information system management used by us to integrate teaching-learning, evaluation and feedback from students. A student can access every single data regarding his/her overall performance from the student portal. The Teaching-learning activities are made effective through illustration and special lectures. All classrooms are ICT enabled and lessons are taught through PPT to make learning interesting.

The institute focuses on student-centric methods of enhancing the lifelong learning skills of students. Faculty members make efforts to make the learning activity more interactive by adopting the below-mentioned student-centric methods.

Experiential learning methods used:

• This method facilitates the teacher to interpret, explain and revise the content of a text-only for better understanding of the subject by the learners. All Classes are ICT enabled, and teachers use projectors, Google Classrooms & Testmoz for an effective Teaching-learning experience.

 \cdot We encourage students to practice various technical and non-technical skills through project work, student seminars, student development programs, workshops, field visits, internships and industrial visits. These activities are planned, conducted and monitored regularly by the faculty members to ensure that students are practicing the required skills, reflecting on their experiences and improving their skills.

• The project and field work stimulates student's interest in the subject and provides them with opportunities of freedom of thought & free exchange of different views. As per the requirement of syllabi, the project work is done. Through Google Classroom a provision is given to students to submit the project report virtually & get feedback from respective faculty members.

Participative learning methods used:

• The faculty members make learning interactive with students by motivating student participation in group discussion, role-play, subject quizzes, case studies, news analysis, discussion, and questions and answers on current affairs.

 $\cdot\,$ Students do regular practicals, presentations and group discussions in the classroom with ICT-enabled classrooms.

• College has a dedicated media lab for students to enhance the learning experience.

Problem-solving methods used:

Students are given exposure to various problem-solving methodologies by solving real-world problems and case studies related to various situations. Such problems have unstated goals and constraints and have multiple correct solutions which are discussed in the classrooms. Such problem-solving activity enables students to not only apply concepts learned but also aid in developing skills related to formulating problems and subproblems, generating alternative solutions, identifying constraints and analyzing and selecting solutions. ICT-enabled teaching includes Wi-Fi & projector-enabled classrooms etc. supporting these techniques. The institution adopts modern pedagogical methods of problem-solving to enhance the teaching-learning process.

The college has established a highly transparent and efficient method of addressing internal and external examination-related grievances. The college conducts three internal assessments throughout the semester, enabling students to prepare and perform better in their final examinations. To ensure the smooth conduct of semester examinations, the college has formed an examination committee, consisting of a Principal as a chief Controller, & senior Faculty member as convenor teaching faculty.

The college strictly adheres to the guidelines and rules issued by the affiliating the University of

Mumbai while conducting yearly and semester-end examinations. The institution approach to addressing grievances is transparent and fair, and measures are taken to resolve them promptly.

Before conducting the internal assessments, the college prepares a timetable well in advance and communicates it to students. A proper seating plan is followed, and it is displayed on the notice board, ensuring that the assessment process is conducted in an organized and disciplined manner.

After the evaluation of internal assessment answer papers, the marks are converted into grades, parents are called for a meeting to disclose the grades. The faculty clarifies any doubts that students may have, enabling them to understand their performance better and prepare well for future examinations.

To make the examination system transparent, the Examination committee conducts an orientation at the beginning of the academic year. The orientation covers the examination pattern, evaluation methods, passing standards, and the process of raising grievances. Short sessions are held by mentors for different groups in their classrooms to clear doubts and explain finer points. The college also uses various communication methods such as class to class announcements, notice boards & class forums (Google Classroom) to keep students informed.

SOP OF GRIEVANCE REDRESSAL

- Any grievances related to Examination are addressed to the Exam committee. Resolutions are made on immediate basis within maximum 3 days and information after resolving the grievances the resolution is intimated immediately to the students.
- In case of an unsatisfactory marking system, a student can apply for re-evaluation, he or she can apply for a photocopy of the assessed answer-book. The college provides photocopies of answer books to the students on application after collecting the University of Mumbai prescribed fees for re- evaluation process.
- In the second stage after receiving the photocopy, he/she may confirm the possibility of change in marks by consulting with a subject expert. And if there is possibility of changes in mark he/she can apply for revaluation by remitting the necessary fees to the college.
- Teachers are approachable and student friendly and encourage all students to communicate their concerns through formal and informal channels throughout the year. The institution and the University have a Grievance Cell to which they can appeal if necessary.

2.6.1.QIM Programme Outcomes (POs) and Course Outcomes (COs) for all Programmes offered by the institution are stated and displayed on website and attainment of POs and COs are evaluated.

The College believes in the Outcome-Based Education process. We practice student-centric teaching and learning methodology in delivery of course, continuous assessments are planned to achieve stated objectives and outcomes of the courses. POs and PSOs are available on the Institute website https://jkcghansoli.in/ POs and PSOs are kept in prominent locations of the campus for staff, students and public view. POs and PSOs are displayed in the Department rooms, Laboratories and Department libraries. POs and PSOs are communicated to employers and Alumni by sending mail and are displayed during the Alumni Meeting. During the class representative meeting and faculty meeting POs and PSOs are reviewed among the students and staff members. The COs and their mapping with POs and PSOs are elaborately discussed and derived by the departments. COs are communicated to the students during the introduction class itself. COs along with pedagogical plans are printed and issued to the students during the orientation lecture on the first day as well as the pdf of the same is uploaded in the course wise Google classrooms. The respective classrooms have frames where charts displaying POs and COs are incredial part of classrooms. During the discussion of the course, the outcomes of the course are also focused. During the commencement of each unit and after the completion of the unit, the course outcomes are reviewed and measured. We focus on measuring student performance i.e. outcomes at different levels of assessment using direct and indirect methods of evaluation.

Following is the process used by the college for POs and COs attainment mapping:

- 1. For every subject 6 course outcomes (CO) are defined and mapped to Program outcomes (PO) on a scale of 0 to 3. Highest correlation is 3.
- 2. Maximum marks allotted to each question is mapped to a cognitive level and the corresponding CO. The percentage is recorded of students achieving a set percentage of maximum marks allotted to an individual CO in a given continuous assessment. All COs are evaluated in the same manner.
- 3. CO attainment level for the course is, Course attainment in continuous assessment is = 0.25

- * Avg continuous assessment attainment + 0.75 * in the semester end assessment.
- 4. All COs are mapped to certain POs, as shown in STEP 1. The overall CO attainment value is computed and the CO-PO mapping values given in STEP 1 is used to compute the attainment of POs.
- 5. PO attainment is computed for a batch using a designed formula. Indirect attainment is determined from student exit surveys, employer surveys, co-curricular activities, extracurricular activities and mapped to POs. A questionnaire is designed for this purpose and the average response of the outgoing students for each PO is computed.
- 6. If the target is achieved then next level is set to be achieved, if not then corrective measures are taken to achieve targeted level of attainment.

The college has established Program Outcomes and Course Outcomes that align with the skills and qualities expected of graduates. These outcomes are provided to students at the beginning of each semester through the college's website. Each course has its own set of Course Outcomes, which are connected to Program Outcomes and Program Specific Outcomes based on what students are expected to learn. The Course Outcomes are assessed using a tool that measures students' knowledge and skills through tests and exams. The average mapping levels of each Course Outcome are calculated and used to determine standards and target marks for each course. Gaps in attainment are identified and addressed by the institution. A mapping matrix is used to determine the correlation between Course Outcomes and Program Outcome are allocated based on target marks, and the number of students who exceed the target marks is calculated. These attainment levels are compared to the average mapping levels to determine the attainment of each Program Outcome. Gaps in attainment are identified and improvements are made to the teaching

and learning process to achieve the desired outcomes.

The course standards are determined by the achievements of previous years. The department head sets a target score for each course based on the average scores from past semester exams. The institution analyzes any unachieved outcomes to identify areas for improvement. A mapping matrix is used to assess the achievement of program outcomes and course outcomes.

The courses' intended learning outcomes are being matched with program outcomes and program specific outcomes. Each course outcome is assessed using a tool that reflects the students' knowledge and skills based on their performance in continuous assessments and end-of-semester exams. The average of these assessments is then used to create a sheet that incorporates the average mapping levels of all courses. Course standards are set based on these averages, with attainment levels of 3, 2, or 1. The Head of Departments then determines the target marks for each course, taking into account the previous years' average marks. By identifying unattained outcomes, the institution can make decisions to improve the teaching and learning process in order to achieve these outcomes in the future. The institution also takes further actions based on the identified gaps in attainment.

Extension activities are implemented in the institution to promote social responsibility and handslearning for students and volunteers. Developing а serviceon oriented mindset is crucial for success in any profession. These extension activities are facilitated through different organizations such as the National Service Scheme, Women Development Cell, Environment Protection Cell, and Department of Lifelong Learning. The institution has established partnerships with Lions club, Rotary club, and various NGOs to engage in continuous social service initiatives. The Lions club collaborates with the center for social science to conduct an annual awareness campaign on Thalassemia, involving the students. On the college's foundation day, the institution also organised a blood donation camp, where students are encouraged to donate blood. Approximately 50 units of blood are collected during camp, and before donating, students are tested for Thalassemia each to ensure their eligibility. If any student is found to have Thalassemia (either major or minor), they are informed and educated about the necessary precautions and prevention measures. The college was awarded for its contribution to the victims of the Kerala Flood. The NSS team received a recognition letter for their tree plantation drive.

They also organized free dental checkа up program for two schools, where experienced dentists examined and treated 302 students. The program included an educational presentation on dental health and recommended dietary habits. A Covid-19 vaccination drive was organized at the college, allowing all students and their family members to get vaccinated. The college's NSS unit also took on the responsibility of improving Bhuwan gaon in Murbad, with guidance from the faculty. They actively worked towards the progress of the village and received recognition for their efforts. The students also spent time with the village children and engaged in creative activities with them. During their camp in Bhuwan gaon, the students conducted a cleanliness drive, with many students and faculty members participating in social work in the village. They also raised awareness among the villagers about saving food and preventing The Volunteers water and wastage. NSS also contributed to maintaining the library under the guidance of the librarian. Additionally, they received recognition for conducting polio drives and organizing a cleanup campaign at Ghansoli Railway station.

On the occasion of Azadi ka Amrut Mahotsav, 17 NSS Volunteers carried out a cleaning campaign at Ghansoli Railway Station. The college was also recognized and honored for its community service and co mmitment to environmental sustainability.

4.2 Library as a Learning Resource

4.2.1

Library is automated with digital facilities using Integrated Library Management System (ILMS), adequate subscriptions to e-resources and journals are made. The library is optimally used by the faculty and students

Response:

JKC Library is the most lively place in the college that enables learning and advancement of knowledge. It has been methodically developed right from inception. The library was established in 2008 with the very inception of the college. The library is situated on the Fifth floor of the building and is made easily accessible from all sides of the college premises. It has a carpet area of about 1750 Sq.Ft. Two sections are available, one for Reading Hall and one for Reference section. The students extensively use Library Reading Hall and around 100 students are availing this facility. It is rich in collections which consist of Textbooks, Reference books, Journals, educational Magazines, General books, Books for competitive exams etc. previous years question papers of college and university examination. On an average 40 books per day are circulated to the readers from the Home lending section, Reading Hall, and reference section of the library.

Attendance of students and teachers in Reading Hall is recorded every day and entry and exit register with sign is maintained. This helps in taking some policy decisions about services.

Library is under CCTV surveillance.

Library is partially automated , under the guidance of IQAC.In NOV 2022-23, college library has purchased LIBMAN, a cloud-based library management software by Mastersoft.

The following task of library have been automated:

- Making entries for daily issue/ return of books.
- Generating reports by applying various filters like the program-wise list of books, subject-wise list of books or a list of reference books, etc.

- Searching books by keywords like the name of the author, title of the book, etc
- Maintaining the membership details of students and staff members.
- Generating reports of the books issued.
- Cataloging, maintaining the database of books, member records, and usage, and book transaction.
- MOPAC (Mobile app) of LIBMAN provides facilities of free text search for the author, title and subjects to all the members of the college library.

IQAC recommended the subscription of N-LIST. So the library has active membership of INFLIBNET N-LIST consortia and provides access to 6000+ e-journals and 1,99,500+ e-books. The college students as well faculties are getting access to high-quality e-resources.

6.3.1

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1

Institution has strategies for mobilization and optimal utilization of resources and funds from various sources (government/nongovernment organizations) and it conducts financial audits regularly (internal and external)

Response:

The institution always monitors the effective and efficient use of available financial resources for infrastructure development to support the teaching-learning process. J.K. College Of Science And Commerce is a self-financed private institution, tuition fee is the main source of income. Along with fees, sales of forms are added to resources for mobilization of funds. Efforts are also made to generate funds for infrastructural development from philanthropists. Sponsorships are sought from individuals and corporations for cultural events and fests.

These funds are utilized for all recurring and non-recurring expenditures. The college requires funds for salary, infrastructural development, routine academic and non-academic activities, sports, games, arts and cultural programs, competitions, participation in university and interuniversity sports and games, for providing scholarships and other kinds of financial assistance.

The institution has a well-defined mechanism to monitor the effective utilization of available financial resources to develop the infrastructure to augment academic needs. All the administrative and academic heads along with coordinators of different cells (viz., research committee, placement cell, library advisory committee (for the purchase of books/journals), purchase committee (for repair and maintenance cost) software and internet charges, printing, and stationary, equipment and consumables, furniture and fixtures), NSS cell, sports, cultural committee etc., will submit the budget requirements for the coming academic year.

The finance committee prepares an annual budget estimate duly considering the proposals received and also the recommendations of the principal and management. The institute's financial committee and CDC make all the major financial decisions.

The institute adheres to the utilization of the budget approved for academic and administrative expenses by management. After final approval of the budget, the purchasing process is initiated by the purchase committee which includes all heads of departments and account officers, accordingly, the quotations are called and purchase orders are placed after final negotiations.

All transactions have transparency through bills and vouchers. The bill payments are passed after the verification of items. Respective faculty member ensures that suitable equipment/machinery with correct specifications is purchased. The entire process of the procurement of the material is monitored by the IQAC, purchase committee, and principal.

students have to compulsorily attend the Orientation Programme, in which they are made aware of the philosophy, the uniqueness of the Education system, the teaching-learning process, the system of continuous evaluation, compulsory core courses, various co-curricular activities, discipline and culture of the Institute. All students are also given a guided tour of the campus and the various facilities. Students are apprised of the timetable, Programme structure, and syllabi of the courses before the semester commences. Important announcements are made in the online portal and attendance and conduct of classes are monitored by the Principals, HODs, and proctors of various classes.

The intrinsic precincts of a deep-rooted patriarchal system continue to pose challenges in the current times. The changing demographics of Higher Educational Institutes (HEI) in India reflect a diverse population on the campus resonating with the ideals of equality enshrined in our constitution. Creating space for equality and ruling out discrimination against caste, religion, sect and sex will harbinger the position of education and transformation in our country. Thus, the need to have a safe working space for students, staff and other stakeholders on the campus is one of the significant aspects of any HEI. Focusing on the primary aim to ensure a safe space and promote a healthy environment, the Women's Development Cell of J.K.College of science and commerce, Ghansoli, has come up with an action plan for the academic year 2018-2023. One of the important ways to achieve gender equality is to have a safe space that will not represent injustice and violence against women.

Deliberating on this fact, Internal Complaint committee was formed to look into sexual harassment complaints. Following which the WDC, now known as Gender Cell plans to focus on programmes to promote women's empowerment and gender equality. This leads to the next aspect of the Women's Development Cell, which is to sensitize individuals about gender equality.

The WDC feels that the gender sensitisation program will be instrumental in encouraging the talks on gender equality. This program will include students, staff members, administrative staff and all the people involved on the campus. The series of awareness programs will largely aim towards first year undergraduate students followed by other staff members on campus.

Supporting Transgender People: Although the ability of each college to put all of these ideas into practise and the resources they can offer may differ, these are the criteria that our institutions are striving for. In attending to the needs of trans students, or students whose self-expression or self-identification conflicts with socially constructed notions of "male" and "female." The main objectives of the practice are:

Context:

The college is located in Ghansoli, Navi Mumbai which is well-connected with the harbor line and central line of Mumbai Suburban Railways. A good number of Students from widely different backgrounds take admission each year to fulfill their dreams.
